MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Ambassador of inner and Outer Peace Dag Hammarskjöld

I came across Dag Hammarskjöld's book Markings, in 1982 after Dag's death in 1961. I was fossicking through a second-hand bookstore in Brisbane Australia and recognized the author's name as Swedish. My mother's name was Nilsson (Swedish) which I inherited as my middle name. I purchased the dog-eared book for a few dollars and it sat on my book shelves for several years. The book was unread because after first sighting it was too confusing, and too complex beyond my understanding. It was also in the language of a mystic, which I was yet to learn.

While studying at Theological College in the 1990's I came across a quote by 13th Century Mister Eckhart crossed referenced with the words of Dag Hammarskjöld. It was some think like, "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is thank you, it will be enough." I found in "Markings" the complementary quote, "For all that has been, Thank you. For all that is to come, Yes!"

I became intrigued about the life of Dag Hammarskjöld, his life work and as I later discovered, his untimely death. Briefly, Dag Hammarskjöld was a Swedish diplomat who served as the second Secretary-General of the United Nations from 1953 until his death in 1961. He was a son of Hjalmar Hammarskjöld, who served as Prime Minister of Sweden from 1914 to 1917.

His death, in an airline disaster or the arranged assassination of Hammarskjöld occurred during a Soweto Uprising and continues to be a mystery. Hammarskjöld wrote only one book and the draft was found after his death with the permission to publish it. It was published under the title Vägmärken 1963 (Markings) by Leif Sjöberg with the English translation by W.H. Auden, in 1964. *Markings* was a collection of ancient wisdom and personal reflections.

Interestingly, Hammarskjöld's writings make few direct references to his career as an international civil servant, nor to the historical events of his time. Instead, they reveal a deeply spiritual person, concerned with the sense that outer political peace must arise from inner spiritual

reflection and truth. His journal is often referred to as a 'modern spiritual classic.'

First a few quotes for the remarkable writing:

- "Never, for the sake of peace and quiet, deny your own experience or convictions."
- "For all that has been, Thank you. For all that is to come, Yes!
- "To have humility is to experience reality, not in relation to ourselves, but in its sacred independence. It is to see, judge, and act from the point of rest in ourselves. Then, how much disappears, and all that remains falls into place.
- In the point of rest at the center of our being, we encounter a world where all things are at rest in the same way. Then a tree becomes a mystery, a cloud a revelation, each man a cosmos of whose riches we can only catch glimpses. The life of simplicity is simple, but it opens to us a book in which we never get beyond the first syllable."

August 24, 1961 Dag Hammarskjöld Translated from the Swedish by Lennart and Gillian Nilsson

Is this a new land, in a different reality from today's?

Or have I lived there

before this day?

Woke up, an ordinary day with grey light reflected from the street,

woke up - from a sombre blue night above the tree line

moonlight on the moor the mountain ridge in shadow.

Remembered different dreams,

Remembered the same mountain landscape:

Twice did I climb the ridges, I lived by the inmost lake

and followed the river towards its source.

The seasons have passed and the light and the weather and the hour.

But it is the same land.

And I am beginning to know the map and the points of the compass

Quiet – as when long bitterness breaks in tears: bare ground.

Soft light over wide, shimmering waters – Around me soft walls of thaw and haze, low ceiling of clouds, mauve from the setting sun. In the lake's world of mirrors, pale olive and pewter, bare alder branches are reflected, swayed by slow, invisible waves.

And then:

Around the lone flame an embrace of warm light in the soft darkness. The white clouds of hyacinth over the mirror, the deep, sombre well. Glimpses of tree trunks in a whispering forest of books.

Not for us, perhaps never for us:

Through the silence the jarring telephone signal from conversations we fled from but shall not escape. Beneath the calm your memory whispers of promises and the peace of burdens shared. No rest if it is not everybody's, no peace until all has been fulfilled.

Hammarskjöld writes, "We are not permitted to choose the frame of our destiny. But what we put into it is ours. He who wills adventure will experience it—according to the measure of his courage. He who wills sacrifice will be sacrificed—according to the measure of his purity of heart."

I can now see the connections between the 13th Century Mister Eckhart and 20th Century Hammarskjöld. These are not direct quotes, but personal interpretations of two reflective men. Separated by decades but not by spirit.

Mister Eckhart

- "The eye through which I see God is the same eye through which God sees me; my eye and God's eye are one eye, one seeing, one knowing, one love."
- Be willing to be a beginner every single morning..."And suddenly you know: It's

- time to start something new and trust the magic of beginnings."
- "Spirituality is not to be learned by flight from the world, or by running away from things, or by turning solitary and going apart from the world. Rather, we must learn an inner solitude wherever or with whomsoever we may be. We must learn to penetrate things and find God there."

Hammarskjöld influenced by Mister Eckhart

- Lord, Thine the day and I the days.
- We all have within us a centre of stillness surrounded by silence. This house, dedicated to work and debate in the service of peace, should have one room dedicated to silence in the outward sense and stillness in the inner sense. It has been the aim to create in this small room a place where the doors may be open to the infinite lands of thought and prayer.
- The explanation of how man should live a life of active social service in full harmony with himself as a member of the community of the spirit, I found in the writings of those great medieval mystics for whom 'self-surrender' had been the way to self-realization, and who in 'singleness of mind' and 'inwardness' had found strength to say yes...
- But how, then, am I to love God?' 'You must love Him as if He were a Non-God, a Non-Spirit, a Non-Person, a Non-Substance: love Him simply as the One, the pure and absolute Unity in which is no trace of Duality. And into this One, we must let ourselves fall continually from being into non-being. God helps us to do this.

I have no way of concluding this brief reflection other than with WH Auden's words in his translation of Markings in 1964.

'If we read Markings without remembering all the time that it was written by a man who was a great "worldly" success, we shall fail to grasp the meaning of the sadness and "unworldliness" of many of the entries'.1

SOMETHING FOR THE SPIRIT Lorna Henry

Springtime is upon us, at least in theory if not altogether in reality. September produced new growth out of the cold weather into a renewal of blooms, blossoms and new greenery.

Taking this regrowth as a symbol of life, at our September meeting we looked at photos of wardestroyed Nuremberg in Germany, the old ruined church of St. Sebald, and its rebuilding and transformation by human effort over 10 years. This was a deliberate choice, a commitment to renewal with a lot of hard work. It was not a certain renewal as in nature. Much pain was involved in this rebuilding, but the outcome brought joy, and a functioning church.

Nature renews itself perfectly each year, and yet human actions are threatening even natural growth and rhythms too. Destruction in the natural world seems more frequent and extreme. What will be the ultimate outcome? What is our commitment to preserve its renewal.

Turning our attention to the world of political choice and commitment, we discussed an article by Stan Grant about America (from The Monthly). It contained phrases like 'the death of the American dream' and 'America is in pain'. Soon Americans will face a choice and a commitment.

Australians have their pain too. Renewal is needed.

We are not in positions of power to effect change on any large scale, but as carriers of the Gospel, we have a commitment to renew, rebuild, transform for the better, wherever and whenever we can. For October, we'll move to reflection and imagination. Poetry is able to express succinctly thoughts and feelings with which we can all resonate. Perhaps even stirring us to new actions?

We will read some poems of reflection about faith and life, and let's see whether they call up individual thoughts and feelings which we can share. The poems will be by local poets, people sharing our faith experience. The names Karel Reus and Denham Grierson will be familiar to you?

We will meet on Sunday October 20th, 5.00pm at 5 Vickery St, East Malvern. And you are welcome!

One further thing. In November, we will celebrate 20 years of Something for the Spirit. Do you have an idea for how we should celebrate??

Our Book Chat earlier this month was, as usual, stimulating and fun and some of the books shared were:

All Creatrures Great and Small by James Herriot. Fresh out of Veterinary College the young James Herriot in the 1930s, James thinks Yorkshire would offer an idyllic pocket of rural life in a rapidly changing world. However, the erratic behaviour of his new colleagues, Siegfried and Tristam, the incomprehensible farmers and herds of semi-feral cattle this is far from it. These stories are charming, heart-warming and laugh out loud funny.

Queen Macbeth by Val McDermid. Shakespeare fed us the myth of the Macbeths as murderous conspirators. But now Val McDermid drags the truth out of the shadows, exposing the patriarchal prejudices of history. Expect the unexpected. A thousand years ago in an ancient Scottish landscape, a woman is on the run with her three companions – a healer, a weaver and a seer. The men hunting her will kill her – because she is the only one who stands between them and their violent ambition. She is no lady: she is the first queen of Scotland, married to a king called Macbeth.

Understory: A Life with Trees by Inga Simpson. For ten years, Inga Simpson lived inside a forest. Each chapter of this nature writing-memoir explores a particular species of tree, layering description, anecdote, and natural history to tell the story of a scrap of forest in the Sunshine Coast hinterland – how the author came to be there and the ways it has shaped her life.

A Collection of Inspirational thoughts & Affirmations Together with Other Interesting Quotations by Noel Miller. Over 60 years of his life the author has collected a host of inspirational thoughts and affirmations in a little black book which have been a great comfort to him during his journey through life which may be helpful to others.


Elizabeth Terrell is now settled back at Cameron Lodge, Wattle Park, after an extended period of respite after surgery.

lan Jenkin's In Search of his Kingdom: The Ongoing Mission of Ewing Memorial Church, East Malvern, A CENTENARY HISTORY, published in 1991, gives a lucid and comprehensive account of our church from its beginnings in 1888 to 1990.



As a historian, Ian has concisely contextualised the establishment of the church in the history of settlement and early development. Drawing of parish archives and oral history, he also consults numerous published sources that are listed in the bibliography. The book traces the parish through each ministry starting with Rev John Ewing 1888 – 1890) and finishing with Rev Alan Wade (1984 – 1990).

The names memorialised in the building itself can be recognised and are brought to life in this narrative. An extensive appendix listing officebearers (including board of management /parish council and elders) provides links with many of those currently active in the parish.

This rich resource invites a follow-up account of the twenty-four years since its publication! Who will put up their hand to form a working party to collate published material and conduct oral history interviews to weave together the developments and changes of the recent past? An understanding of the past is a crucial foundation for the building of the future.

There are still copies to be had through Jane in the Office, and there are a couple of copies in the Library.



Founder and CEO of "We are Mobilise"




